
Celebration Assembly – awards for weekly 'Behaviour Star'.

All pupils are encouraged to treat each other with respect. Children are taught that their behaviours have an effect on their own rights and those of others. We discuss with our pupil's respect for themselves, family, friends and groups of people in the wider community and the world.

Holmesdale Infant School is situated in an area with little cultural diversity; therefore, we try to place an emphasis on promoting diversity and equality through all we do by offering resources and experiences that develop the children's cultural backgrounds.

Assemblies are regularly planned to address this issue either directly or through the inclusion of stories and celebrations from a variety of faiths and cultures. We discuss differences between people, such as differences of faith, ethnicity, disability, family etc.

Children are taught from the Statutory RE curriculum that covers similarities and differences between religions including Christianity, Islam and Judaism. Children learn and begin to understand difference and are able to show respect for other people's values and beliefs.
